

Distinguished humanitarian to receive honorary degree

Brock University will confer 439 undergraduate degrees from all six faculties, 121 graduate degrees and six education degrees during its Fall 2004 Convocation, to be held Saturday, October 16. As well, 21 certificates will be awarded in various areas of study. The convocation ceremonies will be held in the Walker Complex Gymnasium, beginning at 10 a.m.

This year, Brock takes great pride in awarding an honorary degree to Dr. Lewis Perinbam in recognition of his contribution to Canadian public life and record of distinguished humanitarian service. Perinbam was named Chair of the Board of Governors of the Commonwealth of Learning (COL) in April 2003. He is a Vancouver resident and is the second Canadian to hold this post. COL is an intergovernmental organization created by Commonwealth Heads of Government to encourage the development and sharing of open learning and distance education

knowledge, resources and technologies.

He is an Officer of the Order of Canada and he has had a distinguished career in the Canadian Federal Public Service, in international organizations, notably the World Bank and UNESCO, and in the non-governmental (NGO) and private sectors. He was the first Secretary General of the Canadian National Commission for UNESCO, the founding Executive Director of CUSO, sometime Executive Director of World University Service of Canada and has represented the World Bank at the United Nations and at its Specialised Agencies in Europe.

As Vice-President of the Canadian International Development Agency (CIDA) for 18 years he pioneered the creation of CIDA's Non Governmental Organization and Industrial Co-operation Programmes, the first of their kind in the world and launched numerous initiatives to involve the private, non-governmental and institutional sectors in international development. He has led Canadian Government delegations to many international meetings and has

served as an advisor to the United Nations, the Commonwealth Secretariat (London, England) and the National Academy of Sciences (Washington, D.C.). He received the APEX Leadership Award for Outstanding Professional Leadership in the Public Service of Canada and to the Community (1991). He headed the Task Force on the Participation of Visible Minorities in the Federal Public Service appointed by the Federal Government. In 2002, the Prime Minister appointed him a Governor of the Canadian Centre for Management Development, now the Canada School of Public

member who has made a significant commitment to providing and developing quality learning experiences for students in addition to valuable contributions in curriculum development and the mentoring of colleagues.

Professor Emeritus Jack Adams-Webber of the Department of Psychology will receive the 2004 Brock University Award for Distinguished Research and Creative Activity. This award recognizes a faculty member who demonstrates outstanding research achievements, contributions toward the training of future researchers and consistency in scholarly or creative performance.

"These professors are extremely deserving of this recognition and have outstanding reputations," said Dr. Terry Boak, Vice-President, Academic, and Provost at Brock. "They are widely respected for their numerous contributions to providing quality learning experiences for students. Their exceptional teaching and leadership skills reflect well on the overall tradition of teaching excellence for which Brock is known."

Brendan Wolfe, a student in the Faculty of Humanities will be honoured with the Governor General's Silver Medal as part of the Fall Convocation ceremony. The award is presented to the student graduating with the highest cumulative overall average in a first honours degree and who is graduating at the Fall Convocation ceremony. Wolfe will graduate with a Bachelor of Arts Honours Degree in Integrated Studies, Great Books Liberal Studies, Classics and German.

Wolfe, a resident of St. Catharines, completed his four-year program of study at Brock in two years. He is currently attending graduate school at Oxford University on a full Commonwealth Scholarship to study comparative and historical philology. Following the two-year program, he intends to enrol in doctoral studies. He had set his sights on attending Oxford since Grade 8.

As part of the University's 40th anniversary celebrations, several members of the first graduating class called the Silver Badgers will attend this year's convocation. They will join the convocation procession and will be introduced to this year's graduating class. The Silver Badgers represent an important milestone in the forty-year history of the University.

Brock experiences record enrolment

As Brock University celebrates its 40th anniversary, a record number of students have enrolled for the new academic year. Current figures show 16,629 full-and part time students are registered for the 2004-05 academic year. This represents an increase of 1,102 students over an enrolment of 15,527 last year.

Total undergraduate enrolment sits at 15,631 full-and part-time students, compared to 14,669 last year. There are 3,514 first year students, of which 2,700 are direct from secondary schools. The number of graduate students increased from 858 last year to 998 for this academic year.

Brock continues to expand its academic offerings with several new programs: an undergraduate program in Computing and Network Communications; a new Master of Arts degree in Applied Linguistics; and a Ph.D. program in Biological Sciences. Brock is also offering new co-op options in the following undergraduate programs: Earth Sciences, Environmental Geoscience, and Applied Language Studies.

To meet the growing demand for a Brock education, the University has invested more than \$100 million in campus expansion over the last five years with the construction of academic buildings, the Walker Complex, student residences and other facilities. Additional capital projects are underway for the campus that will see an expansion in academic space and faculty offices over the next year. The \$19-million investment includes a new and expanded campus store and academic building, expansion of the MacKenzie Chown Complex, and the construction of the Lifespan Development Research Centre.

Brock proud of its Paralympic Athletes

In her fourth, and final, Paralympic Games, Brock student Elisabeth Walker captured a silver and bronze medal for swimming at the 2004 Paralympic Games in Athens.

In the 50m Butterfly, she won a bronze medal in a career best time of 38:30. In her qualifying heat she placed second in a time of 38:71. At the 2000 Sydney Olympics, she captured gold and set a new world record in the 50m Butterfly in a time of 38:54.

In the final day of competition, Walker captured her second medal of the Olympics, winning a silver medal in the 4x100 medley relay with teammates Stephanie Dixon, Anne Polinario and Darda Geiger.

In 2000 at the Paralympics in Sydney, Walker was a quadruple champion winning four events.

In his second Paralympic Games, Brock men's swimmer Tyler Emmett

finished fourth in the 200 Individual Medley in a time of 2:29:20. In his qualifying heat, he placed third in a time of 2:32:67. Emmett captured a bronze medal in the 200 IM at the Sydney Paralympics in 2000.

The performance of the Canadian athletes at the Paralympic Summer Games in Athens surpassed all expectations of the Canadian Paralympic Committee. The team concluded the 12th Paralympiad with a total of 28 gold medals, 19 silver medals and 25 bronze medals for a total of 72 medals.

Brock is very proud of its outstanding athletes who have competed on the international stage. They have shown the true hearts of champions!

International partnership recognized

Dr. Alzira Silva, Secretary of Community Affairs, Government of the Azores (Portugal) came to Brock on September 13 to meet with various faculty and staff in her first official visit to the campus. Over the last three years, Silva has donated a number of resources to Brock's James A. Gibson Library on behalf of the Government of the Azores, and has sponsored Brock students for a summer-study program in the Azores Islands.

Silva became involved with Brock when Professor Irene Blayer, from the Department of Modern Languages, Literatures and Cultures, attended several meetings in Portugal, as well as the Azores, in recent years. Silva has also assisted with the launch of several courses in Portuguese at Brock last year. The Azores islands are located in the Atlantic Ocean, near the halfway point between North America and Europe.

"Our hope is to inspire and stimulate students, and we can

achieve that through our association with Brock University," said Silva.

"We will continue to host students on exchanges in the Azores, and we look forward to seeing the growth of Portuguese courses at Brock."

In June 2005, the island of Terceira in the Azores, will be host to the International Conference on Storytelling and Cultural Identity. The conference is being co-organized by Blayer, and Dr. Francisco Fagundes from the University of Massachusetts at Amherst, and will feature presentations by several Brock faculty members, as well as additional speakers from around the world.

Brock smoke-free expansion

A further health initiative involving changes to the Brock Smoking Policy was developed over the summer by the University's Joint Health and Safety Committee, the Environment, Health and Safety Office, the Office of the Associate Vice President of Student Services and the Leave the Pack Behind group. This initiative, to reduce

smoking on campus, included a shift in focus away from where you can't smoke to where you are permitted to smoke. It was designed to reduce the number of areas on campus where second-hand smoke presents a risk to non-smokers and to simplify the communication and enforcement of the Smoking Policy. Nine designated smoking areas have been approved and equipped with seating and cigarette waste receptacles provided by the Environment, Health and Safety Office. It is recommended that smokers maintain a distance of at least five meters from all doorways in these areas in order to alleviate entrainment of cigarette smoke into buildings. It is also hoped that smokers will use the waste receptacles provided in order to help keep our grounds free from cigarette waste. Please note that Jubilee Courtyard is no longer a permitted smoking area.

Organic Synthesis conference a big success

The Chemistry Department hosted the 11th Symposium on the Latest Trends in Organic Synthesis (LTOS-11) August 11-14. The meeting was attended by 141 scientists from 14 different countries.

The symposium was founded by Professor Tomas Hudlicky at Virginia Tech in 1984, and convened in Blacksburg, Virginia, every two years until Hudlicky moved to the University of Florida in 1995. The next four meetings were held in Gainesville, Florida. The symposium moved again and convened for the first time in Canada this year, where Professor Hudlicky is now a member of Brock's Department of Chemistry. Over 23 invited lectures were presented as part of the meeting, which also featured more than 60 posters depicting state-of-the-art technology in synthesis.

The mission of the conference continues to focus on the interactions between academic and industrial chemists. It has given many opportunities to graduate students and postdoctoral fellows to display their current projects before an experienced audience. The meeting was well supported by more than 20 industrial companies from the U.S. and Canada and was sponsored by Synthetic Pathways, a subsidiary of TDC Research Inc., a Virginia-based custom synthesis company.

Society in Transition lecture series starts October 18

Society in Transition, a new lecture series presented by the Faculty of Social Sciences, debuts on Monday, October 18, at 8 p.m. in the David S. Howes Theatre,

with a presentation by Carol J. Adams titled "The Sexual Politics of Meat."

Adams will offer a multi-media presentation that explores images of women and animals in contemporary popular culture by drawing upon the ideas she developed in *The Sexual Politics of Meat*, *Neither Man nor Beast* and *The Pornography of Meat*. The presentation will introduce the concept she has pioneered in her work – the absent referent status of animals when they become food – and then will draw upon this to explain the animalizing of women in contemporary cultural images and the sexualizing of animals used for food.

Adams is an acclaimed author whose work joins human rights issues such as domestic violence, racism, and environmental abuse with the status and treatment of the


