Silver Badger elected to Board of Trustees

Tom Goldspink, a member of Brock University's first graduating class, has been newly elected to Brock's Board of Trustees.

Goldspink (BA,'68), was elected at the Board's annual meeting in June for a three-year term ending June 30, 2008. He is a Silver Badger, the title reserved for graduating students who enrolled at Brock in 1964, its first year of operation.

Goldspink, originally from Port Robinson, recently retired as a senior partner after a 36-year career with Ernst & Young LLP, Chartered Accountants, in Toronto. He has long-established business and social networks in Niagara and has maintained strong ties with Brock.

Student trustees elected to the Board were Sean Woodhead, for a two-year term ending June 30, 2007, and Nadia Drozd, elected for a one-year term ending June 30, 2006. Also elected to the Board was Brock staff member Beth Natale, for a three-year term ending June 30, 2008. Dr. Stan Sadava, Professor of Psychology and Chair of the University Senate, was elected for a one-year term ending June 30, 2006.

The Board also renewed the appointments of five trustees for three-year terms, ending June 30, 2008. They are Karin Jahnke-Haslam, David Howes, Angelo Nitsopoulos, Wendy Staff and Dr. Patricia Teal.

Dr. Norris Walker, Director of Walker Industries Holdings Limited, in Thorold, will continue as Chair of the Board to June 30, 2006. Re-elected as Vice-Chairs of the Board for a further one-year term are David Howes, President and General Manager of Lincoln Fabrics Ltd., in St. Catharines, and Willy Heidbuechel, former President and CEO of Eurocopter Canada Limited, which has a plant in Fort Erie. David Howes will also serve as Chair-Elect for the coming year.

Honours society recognizes the best in the Faculty of Business

Brock recently inducted 72 students and graduates into a distinguished honours society that recognizes the top business students in the world.

Beta Gamma Sigma, with more than 415 chapters and 520,000 members worldwide, acknowledges academic achievement in the study of business and fosters personal and professional excellence in the practice of business. In addition to the student inductions, two Chapter honorees were also recognized. Dr. Kenneth Fowler and Professor John (Jack) Edds were honoured for their achievements and their commitment to the Faculty of Business.

The induction ceremony took place on June 28, at Chateau des Charmes, in

Niagara-on-the-Lake, Ont.

Only business programs accredited by AACSB International, The Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business, are eligible to set up a chapter of this honours society. Brock received accreditation by AACSB in 2003, joining top international business schools, and in 2004 was admitted into Beta Gamma Sigma. Membership in this honours society is offered only to the best business students: undergraduates completing third year in the top seven per cent of their class, and graduates ranking in the top 10 per cent of their undergraduate programs or top 20 per cent of their master's programs.

"Brock's business students continue to

successfully compete with the best and brightest in the world," said Martin Kusy, Dean, Faculty of Business. "Their induction into Beta Gamma Sigma is a very real measure of the quality of our students, faculty and programs."

Fowler, who received an honorary degree from Brock in 1991, has a vast network of business ventures, and is President of Ken Fowler Enterprises Limited. He is also past Chair of the Board of Trustees of Brock University. Edds, who is now retired, was the first Professor of Accounting in Brock's Faculty of Business and the first Director of the successful Accounting Co-op program, which celebrates its 25th anniversary this year.

Historical simulations are the focus of newest Canada Research Chair

An award-winning historian and educator, who studies how computers can be used to teach history in innovative ways, has been named Brock's newest Canada Research Chair.

Dr. Kevin Kee joined Brock's Department of History on July 1, as part of a new collaboration of researchers in the field of digital humanities.

"Brock University is dedicated to building a strong research base, particularly in the areas of digital humanities," says Michael Owen, Associate Vice-President, Research. "Kevin Kee is an integral part of our vision for the future of research and scholarship of new media, and his focus on the integration of teaching and research. We are pleased to have his expertise and leading-edge research within the Faculty of Humanities."

Kee comes to Brock from McGill University where he was a Professor in the Department of History and Department of Integrated Studies in Education (DISE) from 2002-2005, and served as Director of Undergraduate Programs for DISE from 2004-2005. Kee previously worked for the National Film Board of Canada where he served as Director and Project Director of history and new media from 1999 to 2002.

Earlier this year, Kee was the recipient of the 2005 Journal of Canadian History Award, and his work in humanities computing has received honourable mention at the International New Media Awards. His research and new media products are frequently highlighted in popular and academic periodicals.

As a result of being named a Tier 2 Research Chair, Brock will receive funding of \$500,000 over the next five years. Tier 2 positions are awarded to researchers who are acknowledged by their peers as having the potential to lead in their field.

Kee's research program focuses on the use of educational computer simulations in new areas of application, including history.

Typically, computer simulations have been used for entertainment purposes or for uses such as the training of pilots (flight simulators). Kee is seeking to utilize the same type of technology to create history simulations, allowing students the chance to be virtually placed into a historical setting.

Kee plans to build on his previous research and create simulations in which, for example, students may walk the streets of late 19th-century Montreal as immigrants in search of work. Their understanding of the past will be confirmed by some of the historical characters and elements that they encounter, and challenged by others, forcing them to confront contradictory evidence. This allows students to understand perspective and point of

CCOVI grad students honoured

The research work of two CCOVI graduate students was recognized at the American Society of Enology and Viticulture (ASEV), Eastern section's, 30th Annual Technical Meeting and Symposium held in St Louis, Mo., from July 13 to 16. Gary Pigeau, PhD Candidate in Biotechnology under the supervision of Professor Debbie Inglis, won the best Enology paper award for his paper, entitled "Yeast Metabolic Implications of Icewine Fermentation." Amy Bowen, PhD Candidate in Biology under the supervision of Professor Andy Reynolds, was the recipient of an ASEV Eastern section scholarship. Amy's research involves the validation of analytical tests for the authentication of Canadian icewines and studies the impact of harvest time and crop load on Riesling and Vidal icewines. The ASEV event attracted over 100 viticulture and enology professionals, researchers, and students from east of the Rockies.

Brock receives \$35,000 in CFI funding to support new researcher

The Canada Foundation for Innovation (CFI) recently announced an investment of \$35,000 to support the research of newly recruited faculty member, Dr. Travis Dudding, Assistant Professor in the Department of Chemistry at Brock. The award was part of the latest round of funding for CFI's New Opportunities Fund (NOF).

Research within the Dudding group focuses on the use of computational and experimental chemistries to develop methods for the preparation of optically pure materials for medical and industrial applications. At the heart of this program is an environmentally friendly approach, where rationally designed experimental methods are produced through computer modelling. This innovative thinking offers potential benefits that include dramatic savings in chemical production costs, reduced generation of toxic chemical byproducts, and a lessened demand on existing natural resources.




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Brock Paddleheads!
