Donna Moody named Director of Campus Security

Deputy Chief Donna Moody of the Niagara Regional Police Service has been named the new Director of Campus Security Services at Brock.

Moody, who has served as deputy chief of the Niagara Regional Police Service since February 2001, will assume her new role beginning in January 2007. Moody, 51, has 32 years of dedicated and progressive experience with the force.

Gary Nicholls, outgoing Director of Campus Security Services at Brock, will leave his position at the University at the end of this year. Nicholls, former chief of the Niagara Regional Police, joined Brock in April 2005 after retiring from policing in 2004.

While at Brock, Nicholls played a key role in developing an emergency services plan for the University. He also helped to co-ordinate the University's transition to a community-based security model, drawing upon his past experiences developing community-oriented policing within Niagara.

"The quality of leadership that Deputy Chief Moody brings to this position will build on the positive contributions made by Gary (Nicholls) over the past year and a half," said Steven Pillar, Vice-President, Finance and Administration. "Her extensive policing and organizational experience will be a welcome addition to the University's security team, which endeavours to enhance the quality of life on the campus by working co-operatively with the community."

Upon being named the new Director of Campus Security Services, Moody stated, "I'm pleased to join the campus security team at Brock and I look forward to using my experience and expertise to support the University's commitment to security and safety on campus during this critical point in its development."

Tourism and Environment program officially launched

"Tourism and the environment are inextricably linked," noted Tony Ward, Chair of the Department of Tourism and Environment (TREN), during the inaugural ceremony held to commemorate the launch of the new department on Friday, Nov. 10.

The new department was launched this fall after a merger of the Centre for the Environment and the Tourism Studies program. It is now housed within the Faculty of Social Sciences.

"If managed well, tourism activities can enhance the environment within which they are situated. In many parts of the world though, that is not the case, and the local environment is degraded by tourism activity," added Ward. "This new program puts tourism and environment under the same lens, looking at them from the perspective of sustainability. In the program, students will examine the key principles of sustainability and apply them to environmental and tourism issues in a practical way."

James Bradley, minister of tourism; Welland MP John Maloney; President Jack Lightstone; David Siegel, Dean, Faculty of Social Sciences; Robert Hoover, Professor Emeritus of Brock University; Dame Julia Morton-Marr, president and co-founder of the International Holistic Tourism Education Centre (IHTEC) and nominee for the 2005 Nobel Peace Prize; and two Brock alumni, Darcy Baker of the Niagara Peninsula Conservation Authority, and graduate student Julie Vanderwerf.

Brock partners with Ontario College of Teachers on new teacher training programs

Most would agree that building strong communities and a strong economy requires a strong education system. Local beginning teachers and seasoned educators are now working together with Brock University and the Ontario College of Teachers to improve teacher practice, confidence, and knowledge necessary to create the type of classrooms where learning can thrive.

Over an intensive two-day period, beginning teachers critically reflect and write about dilemmas encountered in practice. Later, seasoned teachers join the group and discuss these dilemmas. In their roles as mentors, they provide strategies and comment on the skills needed to negotiate those issues using the Ontario College of Teachers' Ethical Standards for the Teaching Profession and the Standards of Practice for the Teaching Profession.

"We expect immediate and longer-term benefits for these teachers and their schools as a result of this workshop. Both the new teachers and the mentors will walk away from these sessions with a better understanding of these two sets of standards that are critical for teachers to work through issues. Plus, school boards will be provided with a new mechanism – the case-based inquiry process we are modelling during the workshops – to enhance their own New Teacher Induction Programs (NTIP)," says Assistant Professor Lorenzo Cherubini of Brock's

Faculty of Education and a lead researcher on this project.

This is a unique, action-oriented, and practical approach to teacher induction. Patricia Goldblatt and Deirdre Smith from the College of Teachers, and the editors of Cases for Teacher Development, will be co-facilitating the workshops with Brock faculty.

Teachers from Grand Erie District School Board, Halton Catholic District School Board, Halton District School Board, Hamilton Catholic District School Board, District School Board of Niagara, and Niagara Catholic District School Board are participating in this program.

The Ontario College of Teachers is the self-regulating body of the teaching profession. The College's involvement with Brock University's Faculty of Education, along with teachers from district school boards of Grand Erie, Halton, Hamilton, and Niagara, creates a strong partnership of experience to support new teachers.

Professors Joe Engemann, Julian Kitchen, and Joanne Graham of the Faculty of Education are also working on this collaborative research and will be acting as joint facilitators and researchers. The workshops were held at the Hamilton Campus of Brock University on Nov. 22 and 23, with two more sessions slated for Dec. 7, and Jan. 25, 2007.

Computer science students place high in competition

A team of Brock University computer science students placed 19th out of 116 teams in the regional Association for Computing Machinery (ACM) Collegiate Programming Competition, held recently at Sheridan College.

The competition featured teams from colleges and universities throughout western Pennsylvania, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana and Ontario. Team "Brock 1" finished ahead of many prominent schools including Queens, Carleton, Windsor, McMaster, and several U.S. colleges including Notre Dame, Bowling Green, Purdue, and Case Western Reserve. The team was comprised of students Stephen Baker, Robert Flack, and Neil Skrypuch.

Brock's other team, "Brock 2," placed credibly at 83rd overall. Brock 2 was comprised of students Jonathan Ross, Dmitry Tashnev, Jiachang Xu.

Professor Sheridan Houghten, coach of the teams, and Professor Ke Qiu, who assisted with the teams, were very

pleased with the results.

"Once again our teams successfully competed against teams from much larger, "big name" universities," said Houghten. "This says a lot about the quality of our students and of our program. The students are to be commended not only on the results but also on their teamwork and sportsmanship."

The ACM International Collegiate Programming Contest (ICPC) provides students with opportunities to interact with students from other universities and to sharpen and demonstrate their problem-solving, programming, and teamwork skills. The contest provides a platform for ACM, industry, and academia to encourage and focus public attention on the next generation of computing professionals as they pursue excellence.

First established in 1970, the competition has grown to involve more than 23,000 students from more than 1,300 universities in 68 countries.

Flu shot clinic today

Every year, hundreds of thousands of Canadians suffer from the flu. You can get the flu by breathing in droplets that someone with the flu has coughed or sneezed into the air. The flu virus is also found on the hands of people with the flu and on surfaces they have touched. You can become infected if you shake hands with infected persons or touch contaminated surfaces and transfer the virus to your own eyes, nose or mouth.

Avoid getting, or passing along the flu. Wash your hands often, use tissues when you

cough or sneeze, and stay home if you are feeling ill. When soap and water are not available, use the hand sanitizing stations that are now located across campus.

Getting your flu shot annually can prevent infection and also minimize the impact of an infection.


