Brock receives over \$295,000 in **CFI** funding to support new researchers

Brock University welcomed the Canada Foundation for Innovation's (CFI) investment of \$295,704 recently in support of three research projects led by new faculty members:

• Brian Roy, Assistant Professor in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology received \$90,345 for the Laboratory for the Study of Skeletal Muscle Čell Volume and Metabolism. Dr. Roy will be exploring factors that influence muscle function including abnormalities that lead to diseases like Muscular Dystrophy.

• Jeff Stuart, Assistant Professor in the Department of Biological Sciences received \$117,208 to study Mitochondrial Oxidative Metabolism and Genomic Stability. His research will investigate proteins that participate in preserving the integrity of mitochondrial DNA,

which are essential to a healthy aging process.

• Kimberley Gammage and Phillip Wilson, Assistant Professors in the Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology received \$88,151 for The Centre for the Advancement of Research in Physical Activity and Health. The Centre will provide an exercise facility for a wide array of research into physical activity.

"We are pleased that our new faculty have been rewarded with these grants," said Dr. Jack Miller, Associate Vice-President of Research at Brock University. "Brock continues to attract the best and brightest to our various departments, and these three researchers are a great example of the outstanding calibre of our faculty members."

"These projects were selected following a thorough assessment process and will help ensure that researchers and graduate students at Brock University have access to a world-class facility and training environment," said Carmen Charette, Interim President and CEO of the CFI.

A national announcement last week of \$29.9 million in funding to 33 universities was made by Charette and the Honourable Andy Scott, Minister of State (Infrastructure).

"This is exciting news for Brock University, bringing economic and social benefits to the community as well as providing opportunities to attract high-calibre researchers to Niagara," said the Honourable Walt Lastewka, Member of Parliament for St. Catharines.

These investments were made under the New Opportunities Fund, providing \$23 million for infrastructure support to newly recruited academic staff, and the Infrastructure Operating Fund, providing \$6.9 million to help with operating and maintenance costs associated with new infrastructure projects.

The CFI's mandate is to strengthen the ability of Canadian universities, colleges, research hospitals, and other non-profit institutions to carry out world-class research and technology development that will benefit Canadians.

Seventy schools to participate in educational camps

Starting on Monday, May 10, Brock's CATI will welcome almost 4,000 Grade 6 to 8 students from 70 schools across Ontario and New York to its spring educational camps to learn, meet new friends and find out more about the University environment.

During the three-day camps, which will run until June 18, students will learn in Brock classrooms, live in residence and eat in the residence dining hall.

The popular spring educational camps are attracting a record number of participants this year - 1.000 more students than in 2003.

The educational camps include science camp, art/media camp, leadership camp, and, new this year, outdoor adventures camp.

"Our programs are active, experiential and designed to meet different learning styles and special needs," says Kate Cassidy, CATI Director. "All of our camps combine learning sessions designed to support curriculum expectations, with recreational activities to develop confidence and interpersonal skills."

Teachers will also have the opportunity to learn at Brock's spring camps with sessions on how to use experiential activities in the classroom.

Scientifically Yours event celebrates women in science, mathematics

Scientifically Yours, a three-day program for Grade 11 girls, welcomes more than 100 high school students to Brock University this week to take part in workshops designed to encourage young women to continue their studies in science and mathematics.

Female students from 65 high schools in the Golden Horseshoe area west of Toronto are experiencing science hands-on by participating in laboratory and group exercises. Among the 19 workshops and projects offered, students may discover what coffee cups, DNA and slime have in common. They may join an ant as it discovers a whole new world in the fourth dimension, or they can investigate a heinous crime and identify the perpetrator as a member of C.S.I. Brock.

During the annual conference, now in its 15th year, students stay on campus in the University's residences. They have an opportunity to participate in various recreational activities, and they meet and dine with working women in the medical, industrial and academic fields of science. These role models in science provide the

students with the chance to learn what obstacles and pressures they may encounter and how they might deal with and overcome them.

Over the years, the event has attracted a number of distinguished women as guest speakers. This year, plenary speaker Dr. Caroline Baillie, a Materials Engineer and a Dupont Canada Research Chair from Queen's University, presents a talk entitled Different or Equal - Transforming Engineering Education.

The program first began with 50 students and has grown to accommodate double that number thanks to a three-year, \$15,000 grant from the Natural Sciences and Engineering Research Council of Canada (NSERC). Additional funding is provided by corporate sponsorship, which includes Canadian Tire Financial Services, Vincor International Inc., Amersham Biosciences Niagara, Inc., Walker Industries Holdings Ltd., and Acquired Brain Injury Outreach Network.

Scientifically Yours is coordinated by The Status of Women in Science Committee at Brock.

West Nile Virus researchers hold mosquito identification workshop

Biological Sciences Professor Fiona Hunter and her team of West Nile Virus researchers at Brock University held a four-day mosquito identification workshop for public health workers across Ontario from April 19 to April 22.

Dr. Roy Ellis of Carman,
Manitoba, who is a member of the
Federal Steering Committee, West
Nile Virus Mosquito Division, and a
co-author of The Mosquitoes of
Canada, the most extensively used
mosquito identification guide in
Canada, gave lectures at the
workshop.

At the workshop, public health unit workers learned how to identify different species of larvae and adult female mosquitoes. There are at least 52 species of mosquitoes in Ontario, and 10 have been known

to carry the virus so far.

For the fourth consecutive year, Hunter's research team is receiving trapped mosquitoes from health units across Ontario for identification as part of a mosquito surveillance program funded by the provincial Ministry of Health and Long Term Care. Identifying the different species is important in order to determine which ones carry the West Nile Virus and to determine appropriate methods of population control since the species respond differently to various control methods.

Workshop participants learned about the life cycle and ecology of mosquitoes in Ontario, distinguishing males and females, and other aspects of identification.


