

Brock applications continue to grow

Brock continues to be one of the leaders in the growth of applications among Ontario universities, with 18,843 applications from secondary school students wishing to attend the University for the 2004-05 academic year.

Initial figures show that overall applications to Brock rose from 10,095 in 2001 to the current 18,843, up 86.7 per cent. The system-wide average increase for the same period is 49.6 per cent. As application volumes were inflated in 2002 and 2003 in part due to the double cohort phenomenon, the Ontario Universities' Application Centre is using 2001 as the base year for comparison because it pre-dates the double cohort effect.

First-choice applications to Brock totalled 3,623 for 2004-05, an increase of 34.5 per cent from 2001's 2,694 and 2002's 2,854 (26.9 per cent). The overall average increase of first-choice applications to all Ontario universities for the upcoming academic year, compared with 2001, totalled 19 per cent.

"Brock has experienced record

overall enrolments for the past four years, and these latest figures show that demand for a Brock education continues to grow beyond the double cohort," said University President David Atkinson. "I am not surprised by this ever-increasing interest in the University due to Brock's growing reputation. More students know about our high standards of academic excellence and make Brock their first choice."

Brock's current total student population is 15,527. The University expects to enrol 3,182 new full-time first-year students for the 2004-05 academic year.

A recent *Globe and Mail* poll placed Brock second in Canada among Canadian universities in student satisfaction for Quality of Education, reflecting Brock's personal approach and commitment to its students and to the high quality of its faculty and academic programs. The University ranked in the top five in a number of other categories: Employment Preparation, Campus Residences,

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Brock receives largest ever gift of \$1.6 million

A recent \$1.6 million gift from the estate of the late Bernard Harrison is the largest gift ever received by Brock University. Mr. Harrison, who passed away last January at the age of 95, was a long time supporter of Brock.

Over a period of nearly 40 years, Mr. Harrison made significant contributions to the University and to its students. In total, his gifts and pledges now exceed \$2.4 million, and his scholarships have provided valuable learning opportunities for more than 40 graduate and undergraduate students.

The estate gift of \$1.6 million will be endowed as the Harrison-Thompson Bursary Trust with the interest providing awards for outstanding students who have financial need. The donation brings the University's Good, Better, Brock! campaign to 91 per cent of its \$29.62 million goal.

Mr. Harrison took great pleasure in being a part of the Brock community. He thrived on contact with young people who were in the process of learning. In fact, he regularly met with the students who benefited from his scholarships.

"We are overwhelmed by the generosity of this gift," said Brock President David Atkinson. "Mr. Harrison has left an incredible legacy through his many contributions to Brock. This gift will help future generations of students, many of whom will face financial barriers, to realize their academic ambitions."

In 1994, Mr. Harrison endowed the five Bertha and Bernard Harrison Scholarships. In 1997, he irrevocably committed part of his estate to the University and made the largest pledge to Brock's "2 for 1 Living Legacy" Campaign. In December 1998, Mr. Harrison donated his house to the University on the basis that the proceeds be used to help complete the financing of the new building to house the Student Health Services and Athletic Therapy Clinic, named Harrison Hall in recognition of his generosity.

University involvement

In addition to being a donor, Mr. Harrison was active within the University as a member of the Dean's Council for the Faculty of Mathematics and Science, and of the President's Forum. He also served many years as a demonstrator in Brock's Physics Department. Originally trained in electrical engineering at East London College, London University, England, Mr. Harrison served in maintaining the air raid warning system during the Second World War, and after the war was sent to Germany to help restore their telephone system.

Subsequently, the British Government posted Mr. Harrison to Calcutta as a trade commissioner. A posting followed this to Madras, in southern India, and then Hong Kong. In Hong Kong, Mr. Harrison met Bertha Thompson, a Canadian lawyer, who would ultimately become his wife. Upon their return to Canada, the Harrisons settled in Niagara, where Bertha's family lived. Mr. Harrison taught physics and mathematics in the high school system, and Bertha was appointed the first juvenile and Family Court judge in Niagara. Bertha died in October 1989.

The Harrisons decided to make their original donation to Brock to support the local university in St. Catharines, since their own university education had allowed them to enjoy the good life. They believed that Brock would bring enormous advantages within the community's reach.

Brock University has become one of only three universities in Canada to meet national accreditation standards for both its Physical Education and Kinesiology programs. With the accreditation, Brock's programs have reached a new level of excellence and offer the highest quality of education available to students studying Physical Education and Kinesiology in Canada.

The designations were approved by the Canadian Council of University Physical Education and Kinesiology Administrators (CCUPEKA). CCUPEKA is the group of deans and directors representing

accreditation and standards in Physical Education and Kinesiology programs at post-secondary institutions across Canada. Brock's Department of Physical Education and Kinesiology oversees both programs at the school.

"I am very proud of the Department for seeing the rigorous two-year process through to completion," said Dr. John Corlett, Dean for Brock's Faculty of Applied Health Sciences. "Brock has achieved an elite status with this accreditation. This achievement is another outstanding reflection of our faculty's reputation for excellence in these important areas of study."

Faculty and staff in the department devoted numerous hours to discussing, revising, improving, and implementing new curricula to meet the accreditation standards and improve service to students.

To be accredited, a program must satisfy the standards set forth in the accreditation guidelines, which includes a review of course availability and content.

Accreditation for Physical Education and Kinesiology programs is open only to the Canadian Council of University Physical Education and Kinesiology Administrators (CCUPEKA) member institutions.

More emphasis on teaching in universities urged



John Mitterer, Professor of Psychology and the recipient of the 2003 Brock University Award for Distinguished Teaching, delivered a talk on January 13 entitled *The Two Cultures of Research and Teaching*.

In his presentation, part of Brock's Distinguished Scholar Lecture Series, Mitterer said the importance of teaching in universities has not kept up with the increasingly greater emphasis that has been placed on research in recent years.

Under the rubric of the "scholarship of teaching," Mitterer outlined four suggestions that universities like Brock could implement to bring teaching back up to par with research in the academic setting. His suggestions included:

- the appointment of an Associate Vice-President of Teaching;
- the creation of a university-wide teaching and learning strategy;
- the adoption of university-wide standardized teaching evaluations; and
- the inclusion of a course on teaching which all PhD students would be required to take before graduation.

Harpweaver presents new novelist from South Africa

The Harpweaver Reading Series at Brock University is pleased to present new novelist Lewis DeSoto for the first reading of 2004 on Wednesday, January 28. Born in South Africa, DeSoto lives in Toronto and spends part of his time in Normandy. He has won the Books in Canada/Writers' Union Short Prose Award for short fiction.

DeSoto will read from his critically acclaimed first novel, *A Blade of Grass*. An *Ottawa Citizen* review notes that DeSoto's novel "never falters. It is quite simply a master work by a mature and powerful new voice."

Set in South Africa, *A Blade of Grass* is a moving story of struggle and betrayal, race and friendship, and of place and home. The novel focuses on the relationship between a white woman and a black woman and their struggle to hold onto a farm in the context of post-colonial Africa. According to DeSoto, "*A Blade of Grass* is written out of memory, not the facts of history but the emotions caused by history. At the heart of the book is a simple question: Where is home? All the characters and all the actions are driven by this question. Where do I lay my head at night to sleep undisturbed and wake to serenity and peace? The anxiety that comes from not being able to answer the question is what gives the book its air of tension, and tragedy."

The reading begins at 7:30 p.m. in the Pond Inlet, located at the east end of MacKenzie Chown Complex. A question-and-answer session and book signing will follow. DeSoto's book will also be available for purchase at the event.
